Architects are listed roughly chronologically.

Architect	Major Works	Details
Sir Christopher <b>Wren</b>	St Paul's Cathedral	English; designed many London buildings after the <b>Great Fire of London in 1666</b>
Louis <b>Sullivan</b>	Wainwright Building	American; popularized " <b>form follows function</b> ;" nicknamed " <b>father of skyscrapers</b> ;" mentored Wright
Frank Lloyd <b>Wright</b>		American; works are categorized as Prairie School, Usonian, and Maya Revival
	Fallingwater	also called the Kaufmann House; cantilevered over Bear Run, a stream in Pennsylvania
	Taliesin	Wisconsin studio, site of a mass murder-arson in 1914, after which Wright built <b>Taliesin West</b> in Arizona
	Guggenheim Museum (New York)	" <b>inverted ziggurat</b> " design with a ramp spiralling down the inside
	Imperial Hotel Robie House	in Tokyo; survived a 1923 earthquake
<b>Le Corbusier</b>	Villa Savoye	Swiss-French; wrote <i>Toward a New Architecture</i>
Ludwig <b>Mies</b> van der Rohe	Seagram Building	German-American; <b>International Style</b> ; last director of the <b>Bauhaus</b> ; popularized " <b>less is more</b> "
Eero Saarinen	Gateway Arch TWA Flight Center at JFK International Airport	Finnish-American
I.M. Pei	glass pyramids at the Louvre Rock and Roll Hall of Fame Bank of China Tower	Chinese-American
Frank Gehry	Guggenheim Bilbao Walt Disney Concert Hall Experience Music Project Pritzker Pavilion	Canadian-American; designs dominated by sweeping, curved sheets of metal
